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The quintennial <u>International Frederick Chopin Piano Competition</u> will be held later this year, and I was reminded that the awards for "Best performance of a mazurka" and "Best performance of a concerto" have not been awarded since 1985. Simply put: Nobody since 1985 has been good enough to deserve it.

The year 1995 was a particularly bad year for Chopin-lovers. The judges for Competition XIII concluded that none of the 130 entrants deserved **any** of the four big-name prizes.

- First prize not awarded.
- Best perfomance of the mazurkas not awarded.
- Best performance of a polonaise not awarded.
- Best performance of a concerto not awarded.

(This wasn't the first time the judges refused to award first prize. It happened <u>five years</u> earlier as well.)

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
