Welcome to Leavenworth, Washington's faux-Bavarian village

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The dying logging town of <u>Leavenworth, Washington</u> reinvented itself in the 1960's as a faux-Bavarian village. Today, over a million tourists visit annually to enjoy the scenic mountain views, soak in the fake Bavarian atmosphere, and revel in events like the <u>Leavenworth</u> <u>International Accordion Celebration</u> which starts tomorrow, or the three-weekend-long <u>Leavenworth Oktoberfest</u> every October. (Mind you, the Leavenworth Oktoberfest doesn't actually start until the Munich Oktoberfest is nearly over, because Oktoberfest starts in *September*.)

I found during a brief visit to Leavenworth that the people there may dress like they're from Bavaria, but they don't actually speak German.

But at least I was there undercover.

Some years ago, a colleague of mine was on assignment in Redmond from his home country of Austria. One weekend, he decided to pay a visit to our fake Bavarian village, and when he returned, we asked him what he thought of the town.

"Well, for a <u>fake Bavarian village</u>, it's not too bad. I mean, nobody would for a moment think it was the real thing, but I appreciate the effort they went to, and it was quite a pleasant little town. But the weird thing was what happened whenever I opened my mouth to speak: People recognized that I spoke with a German accent and a flash of panic crossed their faces, as if I was going to blow the cover off their little ruse and reveal it to be a fraud."
